HIGHLANDS COUNTY CITRUS GROWERS

President's Column by Bert Harris

I read with interest some comments by Peter Chaires, executive director of the New Varieties Development and Management Corp., recently about citrus breeding. We all certainly want to see orange varieties developed that are tolerant of the HLB, and frankly other production challenges as well, and can still function at a high level.

Of course we wish that the UF/IFAS and USDA plant breeding programs were further along in identifying and propagating the trees of the future than they are now. Obviously growers will be much more inclined to step up the pace of planting new blocks, or even resetting, when they feel those new trees have a better chance to thrive, and not simply face multiple challenges to survive.

The good news was that Chaires said HLB tolerance "is an essential element of everything that's being done in the breeding program with a stronger emphasis than anything else in orange and orange-like varieties that would contribute to the processing industry."

"They've gone through and identified the parents that they have in their parent tree program that have a propensity to pass on those tolerance traits as well as the fruit quality traits, and they're only utilizing that material now," explained Chaires. "We've seen two parents, neither one of which were HLB tolerant, but their offspring were. You can have the opposite, where the two parents were pretty good but the offspring not so much. There's a randomness to it."

Varieties that offer HLB tolerance can provide some protection for growers as they await a silver bullet variety with true HLB resistance. "It's really an economic issue," said Chaires. "If a variety helps to make a grower viable, keeps them in business and keeps that land committed, I think that there are a lot of intermediate steps that could really benefit the industry. We see a lot of potential in keeping conventional breeding programs going."

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In his comments, Chaires recommended the UF 1859 sweet orange-like hybrid. It is an HLB-tolerant variety that he said is holding up well in the field, produces extraordinary flavor and is readily available. So hopefully trees such as UF 1859, and others, will soon gain the confidence of growers.

If you are willing to assume some risk and put new trees in the ground in the short term – you really should speak with the staff at **CRAFT** in the next few weeks to see if that program can be of assistance to you.

If we have some good luck for a change and weather continues to cooperate, we will hopefully see in the coming months if investments in OTC, growth regulators and other production therapies are going to pay off with more fruit loaded on the trailer and higher quality at the plant.

So as we enter the new 2024-2025 fruit season, I wish all of you good luck!

Executive Director & Report BYRAYROYCE

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has designated a number of counties in Florida as Natural Disaster Areas due to Hurricane Helene. This Presidential disaster declaration (M4828) allows the USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters through emergency loans.

I think it is safe to assume that our area will be further included in this program once the impacts of Hurricane Milton are determined.

Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation, or to refinance certain debts. FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available, and repayment ability. The application deadline is April 10, 2025.

Primary Counties Eligible:

Charlotte, Citrus, Dixie, Franklin, Hernando, Hillsborough, Jefferson, Lafayette, Lee, Levy, Madison, Manatee, Pasco, Pinellas, Sarasota, Taylor, and Wakulla

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

Alachua, Collier, DeSoto, Gilchrist, Glades, Gulf, Hamilton, Hardee, Hendry, *Highlands*, Leon, Liberty, Marion, Polk, Sumter, and Suwannee

If you are considering putting new trees in the ground in the coming year you should look into the info on CRAFT's website at: *www.craftfdn.ofg* about the Cycle Six **New Trees Plantings Program**. Round Three of the **Existing Tree Therapies Program** is also accepting applications from growers, and info about that program can also be found on the CRAFT website.

Registration is actively ongoing for the **2024 HCCGA Citrus Fun Shoot**, so make your plans now to join us on **Saturday, December 7**th. We look forward to the shoot returning to **Quail Creek Sporting Ranch,** located just north of Okeechobee.

To close, I want to say thank you for the opportunity to have worked on behalf of the wonderful men and women of this organization for the past two decades plus. October 17th will be my 23rd anniversary as HCCGA Executive Director, and I feel very privileged to have played a small role in our collective success. Farm TEAM Card

Just a reminder to consider taking advantage of utilizing the **Florida Farm Tax Exempt Agricultural Materials (TEAM) Card** if you are not already doing so.

The plastic wallet-sized Florida Farm TEAM Card is a physical alternative to the paper exemption certificates and aims to streamline the purchasing process for sales-tax-exempt agricultural materials, making it more convenient to purchase these materials tax-exempt. The card is free, and those interested in applying or learning more (including what is exempt) can visit: www.fdacs.gov/FarmTEAM.

How Does The Florida Farm TEAM Card Work?

- The TEAM card does not expand or create agricultural exemptions beyond those provided in s. 212.08, F.S. A farmer whose real property is classified as agricultural pursuant to s. 193.461, F.S. – OR – A farmer who has implemented agricultural best management practices on property it owns or leases.
- How long does the exemption approval last?
 Unless an exemption is revoked by the DOR, each approved Card is good for five years before renewal is required.
- How will stores/vendors verify Farm TEAM Cards?
 Each card will have a URL or QR Code that will allow stores/vendors to verify Farm TEAM Cards quickly and easily.
- Can stores/vendors make a copy of my card to keep on file for quick reference?
 Yes, with cardholder permission. The card will not display sensitive data such as social security numbers or tax IDs.
 Cards will display the individual or corporate name and

address. The tax exemption number is provided by DOR.

- How many cards may I request under a single entity?
 FDACS will provide up to 10 cards. Each card will contain the individual business or corporate name and address. Cards will not name individual cardholders.
- Will online vendors accept the TEAM Card Exemption?
 User will have to follow the online vendor's procedures and any requirements, which may include submission of the Tax Exemption Certificate issued by DOR.

Update on Efforts to Lower Required OJ Brix Level

Florida Citrus Mutual (FCM) and federal lawmakers from Florida are pushing legislation that would direct the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to lower the required Brix level of not-from-concentrate pasteurized orange juice (OJ) from 10.5% to 10%. The change has been requested because many Florida oranges no longer produce juice that meets the 10.5% Brix requirement.

FCM Chief Executive Officer and Executive Vice President Matt Joyner provided an update on the effort to reduce the required Brix level for OJ. He noted that he had recently "tuned into the Energy and Commerce Subcommittee hearing on Capitol Hill, awaiting answers on our delayed Brix petition."

"Like you, I hoped we would get immediate answers on the next steps," said Joyner. "Turns out, the timeline is being pushed further down the road and clear answers remain just out of reach, again.

"There is good news here, though. We are fortunate to have strong Florida leaders championing H.R. 1750, the Defending Domestic Orange Juice Production Act of 2023. Bill supporters like sponsor U.S. Rep. Scott Franklin and co-sponsors U.S. Reps. Gus Bilirakis, Kat Cammack, Kathy Castor and Darren Soto continue to push federal regulators to revise the Brix standard.

"During last week's hearing, Reps. Gus Bilirakis and Kat Cammack asked Jim Jones, deputy commissioner for human foods at the FDA, for answers on the next steps in publishing the proposed rule to revise the standard identity of orange juice and ease the pressure on growers and processors.

"Rep. Cammack pointed out the Brix petition was not on the FDA's regulatory agenda. 'At this point, don't you think it would just be easier to pass H.R. 1750?' Cammack asked Jones. Later, Cammack added, 'I would absolutely request that you get back to us with a timeline and some better answers when you appear before this committee.'

"We did receive an update from Rep. Cammack's office that the FDA is continuing to move forward on the proposed rule to amend the standard of identity of orange juice, but there is no concrete timeline.

"The FDA stated that the next key step in moving the petition forward is adding the proposed rule to the Fall 2024 Unified Agenda. The Fall 2024 Unified Agenda includes the actions —including proposed and final rules — agencies intend to publish within 12 months of posting the agenda.

"While this is not the clear picture we hoped for with regard to next steps, the proposed rule on Brix could be on this fall's Unified Agenda, which is expected to be published between October and December. We should know more of what to expect then."

Association E-mails

We want to make sure that all of our members and friends that are expecting to hear from us on a regular basis via e-mail are indeed doing so. You should usually receive several e-mails a week from us in addition to the HCCGA newsletter once a month.

Natural Disaster Recovery Loan Program

On September 27th, Florida Commissioner of Agriculture Wilton Simpson announced that Florida farmers, ranchers, and growers impacted by Hurricane Helene can now apply for interest-free loans through the Agriculture and Aquaculture Producers Natural Disaster Recovery Loan Program.

Loans can be used by eligible agriculture and aquaculture producers to restore, repair, or replace essential physical property – including fences, equipment, greenhouses, and other buildings – or to remove vegetative debris.

Impacted producers are encouraged to take photos of any property damage sustained from Hurricane Helene and to save all receipts for recovery efforts and supplies. Specific details on the application process are available on the program's website at: https://www.fdacs.gov/Agriculture-and-Aquaculture-Producers-Natural-Disaster-Recovery-Loan-Program.

Agriculture and Aquaculture Producers Natural Disaster Recovery Loan Program

- Interest-free loans up to \$500,000 for eligible agriculture and aquaculture producers that have experienced damage or destruction from Hurricane Helene.
- Loans may be used to restore, repair, or replace essential physical property, including fences, equipment, greenhouses, and other buildings, or to remove vegetative debris.
- Interested producers can learn more or apply on the website.

Producers that were previously awarded funds for damages sustained from Hurricane Debby may be eligible to apply for damage sustained from this disaster. An applicant may not receive more than one loan per storm, more than two loans per year, or more than five loans in any three-year period.

During a special legislative session in November of 2023, the Florida Legislature passed House Bill 1-C, which provided \$75 million to the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services for a revolving loan fund to support impacted agriculture and aquaculture producers recover from natural disasters.

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Programs Available to Ag Producers in Florida's Heartland

Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' (FDACS) Office of Agricultural Water Policy (OAWP) has implemented a new BMP Cost Share Program.

With this new program, producers have an opportunity to receive up to 90% reimbursement if they are willing to provide data of water quality improvements, water quantity savings, and/or improvement of nutrients along with their project implementation.

Percentages:

75% = no data collection

80% = 2 years data collection

90% = 4 years data collection

*Data collection will be done every 2 years during IVs (Implementation Visits)

Grove First Project Update

Grove-First is based on the idea that treatments for HLB are only identified by improving the horticultural health of trees in the field - improved canopy health, reduced fruit drop, larger fruit, more fruit, and better-tasting fruit. There are two sequential screening trials in Grove-First - Phase 1 and Phase 2.

Phase 1 involves the treatment of three trees selected at random within a block, looking for molecules that produce visual effects that are equal to or greater than OTC. Phase 2 trials are conducted on molecules from Phase 1 that show large effects.

Phase 2 is a grower validation trial designed to determine whether the effects observed in Phase 1 are noticeable to growers on a larger scale. Phase 2 treats three 20-tree rows within a block. Phase 2 testing is funded by the Citrus Research and Development Foundation.

88 molecules were entered into a Phase 1 trial at the USDA Picos Road farm site in 2023 using Valencia/US812. About 20 molecules showed positive effects and were moved forward to Phase 2 trials.

There are seven Phase 2 trials currently underway. The 88 molecules injected in 2023 have been reinjected in 2024. 201 additional molecules entered a Phase 1 trial this year at a commercial Indian River grower's grove using Valencia/US-942.

Additionally, in collaboration with a commercial grower, researchers have implemented a statistical framework, known as design-of-experiments, to test multicomponent mixture combinations of the best chemistries in the field for positive, synergistic effects on tree health. Strategy discussions with CRDF and FCM about how to advance the top combination treatments through regulatory approval are in progress.

Grove-First was responsible for the new OTC label that removed the third-year restriction. The USDA-ARS Grove-First team submitted 12 molecules to the CRDF and Florida Citrus Mutual (FCM) for FDACS review of state registration requirements. Multiple meetings and many discussions eventually led to a meeting with EPA regulators.

At this meeting, the EPA described the third-year rule as a resistance management strategy and was based on the availability of OTC alternatives. When the restrictions were implemented, EPA regulators said they had not realized that OTC alternatives did not exist. FDACS removed the third-year restriction a few weeks later.

Grove-First was developed and led by USDA-ARS researchers Drs. Michelle Heck and Randall Niedz



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CRAFT Program Update



All interested growers are encouraged to apply for Cycle Six of the traditional CRAFT New Tree Planting Program and Round Three of the Existing Tree Therapies (ETT) Program **until 5:00 p.m. on Friday, November 1, 2024.** Program information and applications are available at https://craftfdn.org/.

The CRAFT Board of Directors, with the help of the Technical Working Group, has established a list of Factors of Interest that includes areas of focus that are considered of higher interest for Cycle Six and Round Three. This list, as well as rules for participation

in the CRAFT and ETT program, and payment schedules can also be found on the CRAFT website. The "Factors of Interest" list is not exclusive and growers are encouraged to submit all project applications that they believe may be beneficial in the fight against HLB.

Along with the regular solid-set planting and reset categories, Cycle Six will once again include a "Solid Set with PEP Materials" category. These projects will be between 20 and 50 acres and will look at equal plantings of at least one scion propagated as part of the Program for Expedited Propagation (Lennon Early R20-T30-Parson Brown; Lennon Early R21-T36-Hamlin; Hamlin N14-10; Sweet Orange UF OLL-DC-3-36; and Sweet Orange UF OLL-DC-3-40) compared to an equivalent early or late season standard scion which will serve as a control. Growers who apply and are approved for participation in this category will receive \$6,000 per acre over the course of their agreement. Farms and Ranches Required to File Ownership Information with U.S. Treasury

Many farms and ranches will be required to file "beneficial ownership" information with the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN), a division of the U.S. Department of the Treasury. In 2021, Congress passed a law called the Corporate Transparency Act that requires businesses to report the identity of their owners with the goal of reducing financial crime. Unfortunately, many small businesses like farms and ranches are required to comply with this requirement.

Who must file: Any producer whose farm or ranch employs 20 employees or less, is a corporation, limited liability company (LLC), partnership, or was formed as another type of entity by filing a document with the secretary of state or similar state office is required to file a Beneficial Ownership Report with FinCEN.

When to file: Companies that were registered before January 1, 2024, have until January 1, 2025, to file their report. Any companies created between January 1, 2024, and January 1, 2025, have 90 days from their creation or registration with the state to submit this report to FinCEN. Additionally, any updates or corrections to beneficial ownership information must be submitted within 30 days.

Where to file: To comply with the Corporate Transparency Act, you must fill out a form online at https://www.fincen.gov/boi. The form will require your name, date of birth, residential or business address, and a unique identifying number like your driver's license or passport number.

Producers are encouraged to consult with their attorneys to determine if the CTA applies. Penalties for non-compliance can include a \$500 per late day fine, up to \$10,000 in fines, or even prison sentences for refusing to comply with the law.

2024–2025 Citrus Production Guide

The **2024–2025 Citrus Production Guide** is now available to growers. The University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS) publication includes the latest technical advice on HLB management, tree nutrition, grove management and other aspects of Florida citrus cultivation.

Topics covered in the guide include planting, irrigation, fertilization, weed control, insect management and disease management. For a grove management practice to be recommended in the guide, a minimum of two years of field-validated data is required.

Hard copies of the updated production guide are available at local UF/IFAS Extension offices in citrus-growing counties and at the UF/IFAS CREC in Lake Alfred. The guides are also available online at: https://crec.ifas.ufl.edu/resources/production-guide.

There are two other UF/IFAS publications that growers may find helpful. Which is a research book containing updates on more than 70 ongoing UF/IFAS research projects. This short 17-page booklet is a brief guide to the most important things growers should keep in mind when developing HLB management plans for groves.

Environmental Review Required Before Project Implementation

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires federal agencies to consider all potential environmental impacts for federally funded projects before the project is approved.

For all Farm Service Agency (FSA) programs, an environmental review must be completed before recovery or rehabilitation actions are approved, such as site preparation or ground disturbance. These programs include, **but are not limited to**, the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP), Emergency Forest Restoration Program (EFRP) and Farm Loan Programs. If project implementation begins before FSA has completed an environmental review, the request will be denied. Although there are exceptions regarding the Stafford Act (the federal law that provides for most federal disaster response activities) and emergencies, it's important to wait until you receive written approval of your project proposal before starting any actions.

Applications cannot be approved until FSA has copies of all permits and plans. Contact your local FSA office early in your planning process to determine what level of environmental review is required for your program application so that it can be completed timely.

What to Do if a Disaster Occurs

- Producer or USDA Documents damage with dated photographs, videos and third-party verification.
- Producer reports to a local Service Center as soon as possible to request assistance (immediate restoration applies only to emergency situations such as putting up fencing to confine livestock).
- The county FSA office will provide guidance on the approval process and next steps.





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Citrus Hall of Fame Nominations
